





Sermon Text — Romans 14:13-23

¹³ Therefore let us not pass judgment on one another any longer, but rather decide never to put a stumbling block or hindrance in the way of a brother. ¹⁴ I know and am persuaded in the Lord Jesus that nothing is unclean in itself, but it is unclean for anyone who thinks it unclean. ¹⁵ For if your brother is grieved by what you eat, you are no longer walking in love. By what you eat, do not destroy the one for whom Christ died. ¹⁶ So do not let what you regard as good be spoken of as evil. ¹⁷ For the kingdom of God is not a matter of eating and drinking but of righteousness and peace and joy in the Holy Spirit. ¹⁸ Whoever thus serves Christ is acceptable to God and approved by men. ¹⁹ So then let us pursue what makes for peace and for mutual upbuilding.

²⁰ Do not, for the sake of food, destroy the work of God. Everything is indeed clean, but it is wrong for anyone to make another stumble by what he eats. ²¹ It is good not to eat meat or drink wine or do anything that causes your brother to stumble. ²² The faith that you have, keep between yourself and God. Blessed is the one who has no reason to pass judgment on himself for what he approves. ²³ But whoever has doubts is condemned if he eats, because the eating is not from faith. For whatever does not proceed from faith is sin.







DAILY DEVOTION

Memory Text: Romans 14:17 ¹⁷ For the kingdom of God is not a matter of eating and drinking but of righteousness and peace and joy in the Holy Spirit.

Westminster Confession 20.2 God alone is Lord of the conscience, and has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men, which are, in any thing, contrary to His Word; or beside it, if matters of faith, or worship. So that, to believe such doctrines, or to obey such commands, out of conscience, is to betray true liberty of conscience: and the requiring of an implicit faith, and an absolute and blind obedience, is to destroy liberty of conscience, and reason also.

Monday: Rom 14:13. What had God forbidden in 14:1-12 (v 13, 2, 1)? What are we to do instead? Look over vv 14-23 to see what effect a stumbling block has. How might the strong have caused the weak to stumble (1 Cor 8:7)? Do you exercise a love that considers others' spiritual good, even constraining your freedom?

Tuesday: Rom 14:13-14. On the matter of clean/unclean food, which side was right (14, Mk 7:15, 1 Tim 4:4)? Why is it still wrong to eat for some (v 14, 23, 1 Cor 10:25-30)? What is a conscience (Rom 2:15, 1 Tim 1:5)? What is to inform it (1 Cor 4:4)? Why must we pay attention to our own consciences, and not pressure others to act against theirs (Acts 24:26, 1 Tim 1:19, 4:2)? Pray for wisdom in this.

Wednesday: What reasons does God call for love that willingly constrains in Rom 14:15-18? How does a church living under God's rule (member of his kingdom, v 17) prioritize certain things? How does the Spirit press the following vertical truths into neighbor-love: righteousness (Rom 4:5-6, 12:9-13, 17), peace (Rom 5:1, 12:15-16, 14:19), joy (Rom 11:33-36, 15:13)? Where can you develop these things with those in front of you?

Thursday: Rom 14:19. How does v 17-18 logically result in v 19's application? Why do you think Paul uses the word "pursue"? How can you pursue what makes for peace, especially where people don't practice their faith how, or have liberty of conscience where you do? Mutual upbuilding is a construction word for the church. How can you contribute to building up the church into maturity?

Friday: What applications does Paul give in Rom 14:20-23? Consider the depths of love and care for neighbor that the gospel entails. Consider how deeply Christ loves you. He has given you his Spirit -ask him to work a will- ingness in you to love more like him.

Saturday: Rom 15:1-13. Why do we find it so hard to 'bear with' those who differ from us?

Invitation to the Lord's Supper

Since it is our privilege today to celebrate the blessed sacrament of the Lord's Supper, we are called to prepare our hearts by rightly examining ourselves.

"Do This in Remembrance of Me," says Jesus as He invites us to His Holy Supper. It is not only a privilege, but also a personal responsibility to respond to this gracious invitation. The apostle Paul alerts us to this responsibility in 1 Corinthians 11:27, "Therefore, whoever eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner will be guilty of sinning against the body and blood of the Lord." Furthermore, the Lord, through the Apostle Paul also instructs us that those who eat and drink "without recognizing the body of the Lord eats and drinks judgement on himself."

In light of the scriptural teaching, the elders invite you to join in the communion celebration on the basis of the following personal affirmations:

- 1. I confess that I am a sinner and repent of my sins.**
- 2. I have been baptized into the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.**
- 3. I believe in Jesus as my Savior and Lord who forgives all my sins because of His sacrifice.**
- 4. I desire to show my thankfulness to God by resolving to live in faith and obedience before my Lord, and in love and peace with my neighbors.**
- 5. I have made a public profession of faith in a church that recognizes the sovereign authority of God's Word and that we are saved only by grace through faith in Jesus Christ.**
- 6. I am not under the discipline of my home church.**

If, for some reason, you do not believe you should partake of communion with God's people at this time, the elders would then urge you to refrain from participating today and they would also urge you to actively seek out either one of the elders or the pastor for further instruction. They are eager and willing to discuss these matters in light of God's Word, as they are called to tend to these matters for the purity of Christ's Church, His Glory, and the good of His people.

We are confident that the Savior accepts us at His table when we come in faith, with sorrow for our sins, and with a will to follow Him as He commands.
