Reflections

The word atonement carries with it the idea of the just, holy, righteous side of God's nature being satisfied. God's law required death as the penalty for sin. When God saw the death of the innocent sacrifice, he was satisfied that the demands of his law had been carried out. Sacrificing an animal on an altar did not take away the sin. Man was still sinful. The sacrifice only pictured what was necessary for sin to be forgiven—death and shedding of blood. The blood provided an atonement or covering for sin.

Confession of Sin — Romans 12:1-2

I appeal to you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. ²Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect.

Assurance of Pardon — Hebrews 10:1-14

For since the law has but a shadow of the good things to come instead of the true form of these realities, it can never, by the same sacrifices that are continually offered every year, make perfect those who draw near. ² Otherwise, would they not have ceased to be offered, since the worshipers, having once been cleansed, would no longer have any consciousness of sins? ³ But in these sacrifices there is a reminder of sins every year. ⁴ For it is impossible for the blood of bulls and goats to take away sins.

⁵ Consequently, when Christ came into the world, he said,

"Sacrifices and offerings you have not desired,

but a body have you prepared for me;

⁶ in burnt offerings and sin offerings you have taken no pleasure.

⁷ Then I said, 'Behold, I have come to do your will, O God, as it is written of me in the scroll of the book.'"

⁸ When he said above, "You have neither desired nor taken pleasure in sacrifices and offerings and burnt offerings and sin offerings" (these are offered according to the law), ⁹ then he added, "Behold, I have come to do your will." He does away with the first in order to

establish the second. ¹⁰ And by that will we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all.

¹¹ And every priest stands daily at his service, offering repeatedly the same sacrifices, which can never take away sins. ¹² But when Christ had offered for all time a single sacrifice for sins, he sat down at the right hand of God, ¹³ waiting from that time until his enemies should be made a footstool for his feet. ¹⁴ For by a single offering he has perfected for all time those who are being sanctified.

Congregational Prayer

Sermon Text — Exodus 27:1-8, Leviticus 1:3-9

"You shall make the altar of acacia wood, five cubits long and five cubits broad. The altar shall be square, and its height shall be three cubits. ² And you shall make horns for it on its four corners; its horns shall be of one piece with it, and you shall overlay it with bronze. ³ You shall make pots for it to receive its ashes, and shovels and basins and forks and fire pans. You shall make all its utensils of bronze. ⁴ You shall also make for it a grating, a network of bronze, and on the net you shall make four bronze rings at its four corners. ⁵ And you shall set it under the ledge of the altar so that the net extends half-way down the altar. ⁶ And you shall make poles for the altar, poles of acacia wood, and overlay them with bronze. ⁷ And the poles shall be put through the rings, so that the poles are on the two sides of the altar when it is carried. ⁸ You shall make it hollow, with boards. As it has been shown you on the mountain, so shall it be made.

³ "If his offering is a burnt offering from the herd, he shall offer a male without blemish. He shall bring it to the entrance of the tent of meeting, that he may be accepted before the LORD. ⁴ He shall lay his hand on the head of the burnt offering, and it shall be accepted for him to make atonement for him. ⁵ Then he shall kill the bull before the LORD, and Aaron's sons the priests shall bring the blood and throw the blood against the sides of the altar that is at the entrance of the tent of meeting. ⁶ Then he shall flay the burnt offering and cut it into pieces, ⁷ and the sons of Aaron the priest shall put fire on the altar and arrange wood on the fire. ⁸ And Aaron's sons the priests shall arrange the pieces, the head, and the fat, on the wood that is on the fire on the altar; ⁹ but its entrails and its legs he shall wash with water. And the priest shall burn all of it on the altar, as a burnt offering, a food offering with a pleasing aroma to the LORD.

DAILY DEVOTION

Memory Verse: Hebrews 8:5-6 — 5 They serve a copy and shadow of the heavenly things. For when Moses was about to erect the tent, he was instructed by God, saying, "See that you make everything according to the pattern that was shown you on the mountain." 6 But as it is, Christ has obtained a ministry that is as much more excellent than the old as the covenant he mediates is better, since it is enacted on better promises.

Westminster Confession of Faith 8.5 The Lord Jesus, by His perfect obedience, and sacrifice of Himself, which He through the eternal Spirit, once offered up unto God, has fully satisfied the justice of His Father; and purchased, not only reconciliation, but an everlasting inheritance in the kingdom of heaven, for those whom the Father has given unto Him.

Monday: Ex 27:1-8. What shape was this altar? Why? Of what material was this altar made, and where was it placed (Ex 40:6)? This altar was for sacrifices for sin-atonement. What does its placement say about the only way we can approach God (Ps 51:1-2, 13-17)? How does that relate to praying "in Jesus name"?


Tuesday: Ex 27:1-2, Lev 1:3-9. Compare Leviticus 1:3 with 1 Peter 1:18-20? Compare 1:4 with Hebrews 10:4, 6-18, Mark 12:33? And 1:5 to Romans 3:25. What did the burnt offering point forward to? Delight in Christ's goodness to you!

Wednesday: Ex 27:1-2, Lev 1:3-9. Read Heb 10:19-25. What are three results of the burnt offering (Lev 1:3, 4, and 13)? How does Christ's finished work, and your being united to him by faith underscore the three results of the burnt offering? Where do you generally look for acceptance? Do you really believe God is pleased with you?

Thursday: Leviticus 1:8-9. The whole animal consumed showed God's complete acceptance of the atonement. The whole person spared and accepted was not wholly dedicated to God. How does the atonement profoundly affect your relationship with God (Rom 6:4ff, Eph 5:27)? How are we to express this (e.g. Eph 5:2, Heb 13:15, 16)?

Friday: Ex 27:1-2. What were the horns of the altar used for in 1 Ki 1:51-52, 2:29-32? This seems to be an appeal for God's judgment -spare me because I'm innocent, or kill me because I've sinned. In Amos 3:14 what will God do to the false altar at Bethel? The cutting off of the horns seems to mean judgment, and cutting off false idols. How are you to do that (Mt 5:29ff)? How does Heb 10:7 both motivate us to do this more, but also reassure us when we fail to do this well enough?

Saturday: Ex 30:17-21. Why might a symbol of washing and cleansing have been just in front of the tabernacle entrance?
