Reflections

Jesus did not usher in the same type of kingdom that David or Solomon ruled over. He did not come to overthrow Roman rule by force, as some expected, but instead rules and reigns over the hearts and lives of His people. Jesus does not call us to a sad existence filled with self-pity. Our obedience to him in denying ourselves an indulgence in lesser things brings us to a place where our joy and our delight is far greater, as they are found in Him and His eternal blessings. The kingdom of God is infinitely more valuable than the temporary pleasures, and possessions, and comfort that this world distracts us with. This is what denying ourselves looks like. It is not a call to a joyless existence. It is a call to greater pleasure, and greater joy, and greater comfort that can only be found in Him. We have a king in Jesus. And just as His kingdom is not of this world, this world is not our home. When we do not hold tight to these truths, we are likely to drift into living mediocre lives, treasuring comfort above Christ.

¹²Therefore let anyone who thinks that he stands take heed lest he fall. ¹So if there is any encouragement in Christ, any comfort from love, any participation in the Spirit, any affection and sympathy, ² complete my joy by being of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind. ³Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility count others more significant than yourselves. ⁴Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others. ⁵Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, ⁶ who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, ⁷ but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. ⁸And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross.

³² Two others, who were criminals, were led away to be put to death with him. ³³ And when they came to the place that is called The Skull, there they crucified him, and the criminals, one on his right and one on his left. ³⁴ And Jesus said, "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do." And they cast lots to divide his garments. ³⁵ And the people stood by, watching, but the rulers scoffed at him, saying, "He saved others; let him save himself, if he is the Christ of God, his Chosen One!" ³⁶ The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine ³⁷ and saying, "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!" ³⁸ There was also an inscription over him, "This is the King of the Jews."

Sermon Text — 2 Samuel 5

Then all the tribes of Israel came to David at Hebron and said, "Behold, we are your bone and flesh. ² In times past, when Saul was king over us, it was you who led out and brought in Israel. And the LORD said to you, 'You shall be shepherd of my people Israel, and you shall be prince over Israel." ³ So all the elders of Israel came to the king at Hebron, and King David made a cove-

nant with them at Hebron before the LORD, and they anointed David king over Israel. ⁴ David was thirty years old when he began to reign, and he reigned forty years. ⁵ At Hebron he reigned over Judah seven years and six months, and at Jerusalem he reigned over all Israel and Judah thirty-three

years.

⁶ And the king and his men went to Jerusalem against the Jebusites, the inhabitants of the land, who said to David, "You will not come in here, but the blind and the lame will ward you off"—thinking, "David cannot come in here." ⁷ Nevertheless, David took the stronghold of Zion, that is, the city of David. ⁸ And David said on that day, "Whoever would strike the Jebusites, let him get up the water shaft to attack 'the lame and the blind,' who are hated by David's soul." Therefore it is said, "The blind and the lame shall not come into the house." ⁹ And David lived in the stronghold and called it the city of David. And David built the city all around from the Millo inward. ¹⁰ And David became greater and greater, for the LORD, the God of hosts, was with him.

¹¹And Hiram king of Tyre sent messengers to David, and cedar trees, also carpenters and masons who built David a house. ¹²And David knew that the LORD had established him king over Israel, and that he had exalted his kingdom for the sake of his people Israel.

¹³And David took more concubines and wives from Jerusalem, after he came from Hebron, and more sons and daughters were born to David. ¹⁴And these are the names of those who were born to him in Jerusalem: Shammua, Shobab, Nathan, Solomon, ¹⁵Ibhar, Elishua, Nepheg, Japhia, ¹⁶Elishama, Eliada, and Eliphelet.

¹⁷When the Philistines heard that David had been anointed king over Israel, all the Philistines went up to search for David. But David heard of it and went down to the stronghold. ¹⁸Now the Philistines had come and spread out in the Valley of Rephaim. ¹⁹And David inquired of the LORD, "Shall I go up against the Philistines? Will you give them into my hand?" And the LORD said to David, "Go up, for I will certainly give the Philistines into your hand." ²⁰And David came to Baal-perazim, and David defeated them there. And he said, "The LORD has broken through my enemies before me like a breaking flood." Therefore the name of that place is called Baal-perazim. ²¹And the Philistines left their idols there, and David and his men carried them away.

²² And the Philistines came up yet again and spread out in the Valley of Rephaim. ²³ And when David inquired of the LORD, he said, "You shall not go up; go around to their rear, and come against them opposite the balsam trees. ²⁴ And when you hear the sound of marching in the tops of the balsam trees, then rouse yourself, for then the LORD has gone out before you to strike down the army of the Philistines." ²⁵ And David did as the LORD commanded him, and struck down the Philistines from Geba to Gezer.

DAILY DEVOTION

Memory Text — **1 Corinthians 10:12** — ¹² Therefore let anyone who thinks that he stands take heed lest he fall.

Heidelberg Catechism 123: What is the second petition [of the Lord's Prayer]? "Thy kingdom come"; that is, rule us so by thy word and Spirit, that we may submit ourselves more and more to thee; preserve and increase thy church; destroy the works of the devil, and all violence which would exalt itself against thee; and also all wicked counsels devised against thy holy word; till the full perfection of thy kingdom take place, wherein thou shalt be all in all.

Monday: 2 Sam 5:1-3. What three reasons do the Israelite leaders give to David of why he should be king over them? What aspects of kingship/leadership do "shepherd" and "prince/ruler" emphasize? How does Jesus explain and live them (Jn 10:11, Lk 22:25; 2 Tim 4:1-2)? How can you further reflect these characteristics yourself?

Tuesday: 2 Sam 5:6-10. How are vv 6-9 an example of v 10? Consider what happens to the Jebusites despite their v 6 taunt. What warning is there for us (Prov 16:18, 1 Cor 10:12)? What will be one of the most significant things in this capital city (ch 6:2-3)? Worship of God was to be central to David's kingdom. How can you make worship of God more central to your life?

Wednesday: Reflect on 2 Samuel 5 in light of the theme verse, v 12. How and why had God established David (1 Sam 15:28)? What do you learn from David giving God the credit? How is the phrase "for the sake of the people" to govern David's motives (cf 1 Pet 5:2-3)? Think about how you see God's love displayed in establishing Christ's kingdom (what is that kingdom like, e.g. Heb 12:22-24), and giving you Jesus as you shepherd king.

Thursday: Read 2 Sam 5:17-21 and look for the provocation, prayer, protection, praise, and temptation. What can you learn from this? Read 1 Chron 14:12 to learn the "end of the story" in terms of the temptation to worship the idols they carried off. How do you stand strong against sin and temptation (Mt 26:41, Mt 5:30)?

Friday: What do you learn about God in 2 Sam 5:17-25? What is he like? "We must not tone down vigorous images of Yahweh's power such as Leveller and Warrior. Are there other images of Him that embarrass you and are you prepared to face what they tell us about him?" (Dale Ralph Davis)

Saturday: Read 2 Sam 6. What do you learn about God from this chapter?
