DAILY DEVOTION

Heidelberg Catechism 103. What does God require in the fourth commandment? First, that the ministry of the gospel and the schools [seminaries] be maintained; and that I, especially on the sabbath, that is, on the day of rest, diligently frequent the church of God, to hear his word, to use the sacraments, publicly to call upon the Lord, and contribute to the relief of the poor. Secondly, that all the days of my life I cease from my evil works, and yield myself to the Lord, to work by his Holy Spirit in me: and thus begin in this life the eternal sabbath.

Monday: Mark 6:30-34. What had the disciples been doing (6:7, 12-13)? How did Herod respond to this (6:16, 27-29)? How do you see the cost of faithful service in both 6:12f and 27-29? In light of this, why did Jesus charge them to retreat/rest? Observe Jesus' care for his servants. How can you make this resting month restful? Ask the Lord to give you rest, and to refresh you.

Tuesday: Mark 6:30-34. What reason does v 31 give for their need for rest? Can you relate to such a busy, hectic life? Jesus charges them to "come away to a secluded place." How can you creatively make even small secluded retreats this month to refresh, rebuild physically, emotionally, and spiritually (e.g. instead of Sunday school, listening to music with your household)? What did the disciples/you have to cut out to make this happen (e.g. social media, simple dinner, TV)?

Wednesday: Mark 6:30-34. The disciples did not go on an individual vacation. Who all went on this retreat? How would this retreat from doing provide opportunity for relationship building among the diverse disciples? Where can you do this this month? How would this retreat with Jesus provide opportunity to "go deep" with Him? How can you rest in some areas to "go deep" with Jesus this month? Consider Lk 10:39-42.

Thursday: Mark 6:30-34. How important is regular "active resting" to God (e.g. Gen 2:2, Ex 20:9f, Josh 1:13, 2 Chron 36:21, Mt 11:28, Rev 14:13)? Why is it so hard for us to rest (e.g. I have too much to do to reserve Sunday for God)? What might the disciples have said in response to Jesus' charge to rest (Mk 6:12-13, 30)? How does resting (Sundays and beyond) challenge your idols, and stretch your trust?

Friday: Mark 6:30-34. Despite Jesus' own need for rest, what does he do in vv 33-34? Contrast Jesus kingship with that of Herod (Mk 6:16-20, 25-27). Jesus had compassion on the needy. He is not a driver, but a compassionate king. He offers you rest (Mt 11:28). Rest in his perfect sacrifice for your sins, his perfect righteousness for your failures, and his promise to provide so you can rest.

Saturday: Read Luke 1:26-38. In v 38 how does Mary "rest" in the Lord despite life-changing news?
