Reflections

God's radiating majesty kills the rotten marrow of sin and replaces it with humility. A heart humbled by God's terrible majesty can begin its recovery and grow strong. Sin can't thrive in a humble heart."

When we remember the predominant use of cup imagery in the OT (a symbol of God's judgment against sin), Jesus' repeated use of the word cup to signify his impending death takes on great significance. When he pleads, "Abba, Father...Take this cup from me" (Mark 14:36), we realize that his anguish grows principally from the prospect of feeling the full weight of his Father's anger against sin fall on himself. Jesus' ordeal is especially poignant because he, alone among humankind, does not deserve God's wrath, yet he chooses to surrender to crucifixion so that sinners can receive forgiveness. As the soldiers come to arrest him, humility and heroism mingle in his words: "Shall I not drink the cup the Father has given me?" (John 18:11). Because Jesus drinks the cup of death, he can offer his followers the cup of the new covenant.

DAILY DEVOTION

Memory Verse: Philippians 2:11 — ⁹Therefore God has highly exalted him and bestowed on him the name that is above every name, ¹⁰ so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, ¹¹ and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Westminster Confession of Faith 8.4 This office (of Mediator) the Lord Jesus did most willingly undertake; which that He might discharge, He was made under the law, and did perfectly fulfil it; endured most grievous torments immediately in His soul, and most painful sufferings in His body; was crucified, and died, was buried, and remained under the power of death, yet saw no corruption. On the third day He arose from the dead, with the same body in which He suffered, with which also he ascended into heaven, and there sits at the right hand of His Father, making intercession, and shall return, to judge men and angels, at the end of the world.

Monday: Phil 2:5. What attitude does God want you to have (vv 1-4)? Think about areas where you struggle to have this attitude. Paul doesn't just say "stop it, be different." What does he say (vv 5ff, Rom 12:1-3)? Rework a time of pride, rivalry in light of Christ's attitude and work. How does being united to Christ ("in Christ) give you the strength you need to do this?

Tuesday: Phil 2:6-7. Have you ever grasped after position, reputation, respect, etc? If anyone had that right, it was Jesus as true God (v 6). Instead of grasping after the glory that was his, how did he make himself nothing (v 7, 8)? Why did he do this (Heb 2:17-18)? Where do you demand your rights, recognition, and admiration? In contrast, ponder the glory of Christ in vv 6-7. What place is there for pride in us? How does this move you to humility?

Wednesday: Phil 2:7-8. There is little as shocking as this phrase: "Christ the servant." Read John 13:1-17, noting especially vv 13-15. Let this text move you to a prayer of adoration and thanks, confession. How will you "do just as I have done to you" (15)?

Thursday: Phil 2:5-11. What do you learn about the one person (v 5, 11) and two natures (v 6, v 8) of Jesus Christ? Did Christ retain his full divinity while on earth (Col 1:19, 2:9, Heb 1:3)? Of what then did he empty himself (v 7)? God took on human nature and bodily form to save sinful, rebellious man. How are vv 10-11 a fitting response? Are they your response?

Friday: Phil 2:9-11. If Phil 2 ended at v 8, what impression might you be left with about Jesus, and God's presence or lack thereof? Was God inactive in Christ's suffering? What was the result of his suffering? How does Paul himself receive encouragement from this "exaltation later" to humbly press on during suffering now (Phil 3:11, 20-21, 2 Tim 2:9-13)? How does this unmerited but glorious future free us to humble minds and service now (Mt 18:4)? Pray for the Spirit's help in this attitude and action.
