Reflections

"There is no greater state than to get up from your knees knowing that God has forgiven every sin you've ever committed." ~ R.C. Sproul

Christ is to the souls of men what the sun is to the world. He is the center and source of all spiritual light, warmth, life, health, growth, beauty, and fertility. Like the sun, He shines for the common benefit of all mankind--for high and for low, for rich and for poor, for Jew and for Greek. Like the sun, He is free to all . All may look at Him, and drink health out of His light. If millions of mankind were mad enough to dwell in caves underground, or to bandage their eyes, their darkness would be their own fault, and not the fault of the sun. So, likewise, if millions of men and women love spiritual "darkness rather than light," the blame must be laid on their blind hearts, and not on Christ. "Their foolish hearts are darkened." (John 3:19; Romans 1:21.) But whether men will see or not, Christ is the true sun, and the light of the world. There is no light for sinners except in the Lord Jesus. ~J.C. Ryle

Between us and eternal life there are two great obstacles. One is that we are spiritually lifeless and dead. The other is that we are sinfully corrupt and guilty. We cannot inherit life as children of God if we are dead and if we are guilty. But God so loved us that he did two things. He sent his Spirit to cause us to be born again, to quicken us and make us pass from death to life. And so he overcomes the first obstacle. But in perfect harmony with the work of his Spirit God sent his Son to die for our sin (John 1:29) and remove the guilt of all who believe in him. So the moment we believe in him, even though we are sinners, we are authorized in him to lay hold on the inheritance of the children of God. And so the second obstacle is removed. ~John Piper

- *Adult Sunday School descriptions, as we begin Sunday school next week, here are the offerings for the adult classes:
 - John Jastrzembski will lead a study through the book of Deuteronomy, based on Dr. Robert Godfrey's Deuteronomy video series. Many Christians are surprised to learn that Deuteronomy is one of the most frequently quoted books in the New Testament. Why did Jesus and the Apostles teach from it so often, and what can you gain from reading it today? Dr. W. Robert Godfrey connects the land, laws, and leaders of Deuteronomy to the Christian life. At first glance, this ancient book may seem irrelevant. But take a closer look, and you'll discover how it points to the Savior and helps prepare your heart for Him.
 - Dave Myers will lead the class through "For the Body." The human body is an amazing gift, yet today, many people downplay its importance and fail to understand what Christianity teaches about our bodies and their God-given purposes. We misunderstand how the body was designed, its role in relating to others,

and lack awareness of the dangers of objectifying the body, divorcing it from its intended purpose. In *For the Body*, author Timothy Tennent looks at what it means to be created in the image of God and how our bodies serve as icons that illuminate God's purposes. Tennent examines topics like marriage, family, singleness, and friendship, and he looks at how the human body has been objectified in art and media today. He also offers a framework for discipling people today in a Christian theology of the body.

DAILY DEVOTION

Memory Text Isaiah 6:1-3 — In the year that King Uzziah died I saw the Lord sitting upon a throne, high and lifted up; and the train of his robe filled the temple.

Westminster Confession of Faith 2.1 There is but one only, living, and true God, who is infinite in being and perfection, a most pure spirit, invisible..., most loving, gracious, merciful, long-suffering, abundant in goodness and truth, forgiving iniquity, transgression, and sin; the rewarder of them that diligently seek Him; and withal, most just, and terrible in His judgments, hating all sin, and who will by no means clear the guilty.

Monday: Isaiah 1:1-2. Contrast King David and Solomon to King Ahaz (2 Ki 16:2, 15-17, 2 Chron 28:21-24). From that information, what message do you think Isaiah will bring (see 1:9, 6:9-13)? Peak ahead to see how broad and far God's message of hope goes (52:7-8, 65:17, 25). How does Jesus fulfill this same grace, and ensure our future hope?

Tuesday: Isaiah 1:2-3. Skim Deut 32:1-29 (esp v 1, 20-21, 28) and determine how and why Isaiah pick up on this language in Is 12. How did God "raise and bring up" Israel as his children (Ezek 16:1-15, or Ex 4:22, 19:4-6)? What does this tell you about God's character? How do v 3's pictures underline how Israel *should* have responded. How *did* they? Are you living like God's child (Eph 5:1ff, 1 Pet 1:14)?

Wednesday: Is 1:4. What does "ah" communicate? In the first sentence of v 4, what four ways does Isaiah describe the nation? Is this a one-off sin? What is their problem (Rom 3:10-18, Jer 17:9)? How do you diminish, dismiss, or deflect your sin? From the second half of v 4, how is sin first against God? How does this make it so much worse? What do you, and what should you do with sin (Ps 51:1-4, Mk 1:15)?

Thursday: Is 1:5-8. What two pictures does Isaiah paint in vv 5-6, and 7-8? What Iesson should Israel have gotten from these situations (Lev 26:14-25, Deut. 32:23, 32, 1 Ki 8:33-34, Heb 12:5-13)? Although our nation is not a theocracy like Israel, does God discipline his church and his children? Ponder this. Is there any evil way in you that you need to turn from, to God? Seek him, live for him, and know his mercy and power.

Friday: Isaiah 1:9. What happened to Sodom and Gomorrah (Gen 19:24, 29)? What does God do despite what Israel deserved (1:9)? What does this tell you about God's character? Why does God do this (Gen 17:7f, 2 Sam 7:13, Rom 9:27-29 and 9:6)? How do you see this glorious grace in Eph 2:1-10? Isaiah's name means "The LORD is (the source of) salvation." And as we'll see, this salvation is much broader, longer, deeper, and sure than Israel expected.

Saturday: Read Isaiah 1:10-31. What is the first sin Isaiah confronts? Why?
